When it comes to reading the Bible are you excited to read it or do you put it off? How we view scripture shapes how we answer this question. If we see the Bible as just a boring book, then most likely we won't be excited to open it and dive in. If we see scriptures as God's true word that tells one big story, it becomes more than a book. The Bible engages us with the Lord

The Bible helps us to learn about the Lord

We see him move throughout time in order to fulfill his plan and promises. Remember those letters I got from my friends? As I read them, I learned about what made them happy and what made them upset.
